## Youth football is all about fun with friends

Fall means football, around here, along with other sports but there is something joyous about seeing a young kid put on a large helmet, shoulder pads and cleats and pretend he's turned pro while running around waving his arms for a cheering crowd only he can hear.

"He's going for the touchdown! He's got it! He's in!" his teammates yell, like miniature sportscasters. They all tumble to the ground, still pretending they had just won a big game.

The handful of tiny football players, who are part of the Snohomish 89ers White team, continue to play catch and keep-away, laughing and narrating their moves and tumbles into the pretend-endzone.

Soon after, their coach approaches and tells them to put on their gear and start warming up. The boys disperse and get down to business. It's football practice.

The Snohomish Panthers Junior Football Association

boasts several football teams with young athletes ranging from age 5 to 14. It is part of the larger North Sound Junior Football League, along with other area junior football leagues from Monroe, Lake Stevens, Everett, Stanwood, Arlington and Marysville. Each young team essentially "feeds" into their high school teams, as the athletes age and learn about the sport.

As the eight and nine-year-olds gear up for practice, head coach Travis Clark takes a minute to talk football.

"I love football because of what it teaches," Clark said. "It teaches players about accountability, team work, a chance to be part of a team and gives them the desire to finish something."

Clark's son, Chase, who plays for the team his dad coaches, agreed.

"I also like to play with my friends and to hit people - it's fun," Chase, 9, said. For his 89er White team, he plays quarterback and free safety. He said his favorite part about playing in a football game is scoring a touchdown. So far this season, he said he's

scored four.

"I want to keep playing up to high school," he said.

The other teammates were saying the same thing - that they love football and want to keep playing as they grow up.

"When I grown up, I want to go to Washington State University and then I want to go pro," said running back/linebacker Caden Acosta, 10. "It's fun to be with my friends and to be on the field, I've been playing since I was five. I want to keep playing."

It's as simple as that.

The 89ers team are taught football fundamentals such as player positions, plays, rules and discipline.

"I like football because it's a fun sport and you get to hit people," said slot receiver/linebacker Rider Walsh, 9. "It's not very hard to learn and play, either. I've been playing for four years now."

Coach Travis said teaching the kids about the sport is also part of what he does as a coach. He's been at it for six years.

"Football is a sport that is just different than the other sports, because it relies on total teamwork," he said.

The kids all seem to take to the teamwork well, since most of them said they love to play with their friends and have a job they need to do on the field.

"I block," said defensive tackle/offensive guard Trevor Lovell, 9. "I'm a lineman. It's my third season to play and I really like it. I play everyday,

even at recess, with my friends. I want to be an athlete when I grow up."

All the boys have dreams to keep playing, amid big cheering crowds and team praises, and it all starts when they begin playing at a young age.

"The competitiveness of

the sport gives them an opportunity to shine, but most importantly, be part of a team," Coach Travis said.

As the boys all gathered up to run warm-ups and drills, the enthusiasm was contagious. It was a good day, a good season, to play some football.

## Killer Whale Tales

On Saturday, October 7, at 1 p.m., the Adopt A Stream Foundation and Snohomish County Parks are presenting Killer Whale Tales at the Northwest Stream Center in Mc Collum Park, 600-128th Street SE in Everett. Reservations are required by calling 425-316-8592 (\$5 Adopt A Stream Foundation Members, \$7 non-members). In addition to seeing a fabulous killer whale event, reservation holders will be able to enjoy seeing a Trout Stream Exhibit and fall foliage next to a 1/2 mile long Elevated Nature Trail. The Gate House will open one hour in advance for early arrivals.

Killer Whale Tales was created by Jeff Hogan who has been conducting research on the San Juan Killer Whales over the last 17 years. In addition

to being a biologist, Jeff is a professional photographer and a trained actor. He puts on a "whale of a show" that has been enjoyed by more than 65,000 folks along the west coast!

Jeff is bringing the San Juan Killer Whale population to the Northwest Stream Center via amazing photographs and underwater video. After attending this show, when you see a Killer Whale in the wild, you will be able to recognize if that whale is swimming to get to another location, hunting for salmon, or just playing. You will also be able to tell if killer whales are sleeping. It turns out that their brains are so large that they put half their brain to sleep when they are tired and keep moving with the other half of their brain awake in slumber mode!

Thanks to a research webcam that was temporarily attached to a very large male Killer Whale's dorsal fin (the big fin on its back that sticks out of the water), Jeff will also provide you a "whale's eye view" of what it is like to swim with the San Juan pod!

During this event, which will be opened by Sammy the Salmon, you will be provided "whale trading cards" that will enable you to identify each whale by looking at its dorsal fin. You will also find out that it is fun to be a whale researcher. Killer Whale Tales is a wonderful event for elementary aged kids to old-timers...it is a good idea to register early as space is limited!

Bats pollinate banana trees, I became a big bat fan." They also pollinate



breadfruit, avocados, dates, figs, peaches and mangoes. In the tropics, bats spread seeds for trees that are essential for the rain forests. In North America bats control insects...a single Mouse Eared bat can eat up to 600 mosquitoes in an hour!

The whole family will learn that we really don't need to be worried about vampire bats. Real vampires are only found in the tropics and they don't care for human blood... sorry Dracula, there are no

vampires in Transylvania... and vampire saliva is being used in the development of a new medicine for people with heart disease!

• **Thunder Knob & Washington Pass: Oct. 10** ~ This trip features two relatively easy hikes, one alongside a mountain creek, and the other climbing gently to a hilltop viewpoint. Round trip is 6 miles with 700 foot elevation gain. Adults \$51, youth age 8-17 are \$43. Code # 94852

• **Mountain Lake Loop: Oct. 18** ~ Take a leisurely hike around Mountain Lake then drive up to Mt. Constitution to see the fantastic views. Round trip is 4 miles with 200 foot elevation gain. Adults

• **Nooksack River & Silver Lake Park: Nov. 12** ~ Take a hike along one of the North

Cascades' grandest and wildest rivers. Also visit a county park along a serene mountain lake. Total hiking is 4 miles with 400 foot elevation gain. Adults \$42, youth age 8-17 are \$34. Code # 94844

• **Boulder River Trail: Nov. 14** ~ Highlights on this hike near Darrington include giant trees, waterfalls and soothing sounds of the wild river. Round trip is up to 5 miles with 600 foot elevation gain. Adults \$39, youth age 7-17 are \$31. Code # 94845
